Greetings,

The Baltimore City Department of Public Works (DPW) is excited to roll out the long-awaited Resident Advisory Council (RAC). Community engagement is the heart of a successful organization. As the Director of DPW, I understand the value that community members can bring to changing the perception, narrative and landscape of Baltimore.

DPW cannot solve illegal dumping and blight alone. However, we acknowledge that we play a significant role in addressing the issues. We understand that DPW's infrastructure is not functioning at full capacity in all areas. The great news is, it can be and will be improved over time.

As DPW moves toward becoming the "best in its class," by continuously striving to improve how we collect and treat wastewater, deliver high quality drinking water, overhaul solid waste, manage our reservoirs, and engage and empower employees, we remain optimistic in our commitment to serve communities that care and want to be part of the solution to make Baltimore better.

When I first came to Baltimore, I was ecstatic to learn that Baltimore has over 240 dedicated, energetic community associations, a very active and diverse faith-based community, and thoughtful individuals like you. Upon my arrival, I committed to bringing all of these contributors together to see how they could change how people view Baltimore internally and externally. I considered that, while we probably won't be able to change all behaviors that have proven harmful to the City, we can and will send encouraging messages that illegal dumping is not allowed in our neighborhoods and recycling represents positive change toward sustaining our environment. Our reservoirs are Baltimore's hidden gems. Baltimore is truly a destination city, but we must eliminate the undesirable noise in order for us to tell our story of the value we bring to Maryland. We, as a collective team, can tell that story, and I am here to lead the way... but, I can only do it with you on my team.

DPW will continue to advocate and encourage community engagement as we ensure that we make decisions with equitable outcomes in mind; educate internal and external stakeholders; eradicate litter and blight; and, finally, administer environmental enforcement to enhance the beauty of our City. I look forward to chairing the RAC and hearing, learning, and implementing many of the ideas from the various participating entities as we put this world-class Council and Volunteer Network together. We will redefine who we are and the value we bring.


MISSION

PURPOSE

RAC will engage the community at a greater, collaborative level in providing input, thoughts and ideas regarding DPW's operations and new direction.

MEMBERSHIP

RAC will be comprised of approximately 20 Baltimore City residents, representing a crosssection of community-▲based interests.

This will include neighborhood associations, vulnerable populations, businesses, faith-based and educational institutions. In addition to the Director of the Department of Public Works who will be the Chair, representatives from other City Departments are invited to serve as ad hoc advisory members at the request of the RAC.

The Director of Public Works will solicit input from the community to help in the establishment of all policies, directives, and initiatives.

QUALIFICATIONS, OUTREACH & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Qualifications

DPW will require completion and submittal of an application from Baltimore City residents who live within the City limits and agree to serve on the RAC.

To qualify for RAC, you must be:

- Resident of Baltimore City
- 16 years of age or older
- Registered Voter
- Passionate about community service
- Attend a monthly meeting (online or in-person per COVID-19 mandates)
- Serve a two-year term
- Attend at least one DPW community event
- Contribute to the development of DPW outreach programs
- Serve as ambassadors for the program by actively advocating for proper waste disposal in communities and promoting cleanup efforts

STRATEGIES

The initial focus of the RAC will be on solving issues of blight and illegal dumping throughout Baltimore. RAC will examine policies and practices and have the opportunity to offer solutions to beautify the City guided by the principle of the 4Es: Equity, Education, Eradication, and Enforcement.

Goal: Increase advocacy through partnerships and leveraging services

Strategy: Conduct planned meetings with RAC Members and respond promptly to all correspondence regarding incidents/ problems; actively coordinate with partners that identify new or recurring incidents to prevent problem expansion; and, communicate results.

Measurement: Maintain data on the number of meetings, presentations, attendance numbers, communities and participating partners included in each engagement; record time and action measures; and, maintain log of responsive communications.

Goal: Build trust and share partners' value to perpetuate strong working relationships by sharing hopes and desires, which are to be taken seriously and result in tangible change. Deliver a comprehensive educational program to all children in Baltimore schools through the ECO Ambassador Program including a combination of classroom presentations, and teacher trainings tailored to existing curricula.

Strategy: Expand and deepen volunteer program to raise awareness; support community engagement and blight reduction; organize and launch a robust volunteer program citywide that will empower residents to take ownership of the conditions of their neighborhoods; and, engage volunteers in recycling, cleanup, education, and enforcement activities.

Measurement: Maintain number of partner programs doing work in any blightabatement related program; number of events or program days (cleanups, educational outreach, recycling efforts, etc.); and, volume of waste properly disposed of by partnering groups.

Goal: Empower residents to rid their neighborhoods of blight and deliver high quality services, growing community trust and pride in communities.

Strategy: Conduct a robust communications campaign educating residents about enforcement, applicable laws, and potential fines for illegal dumping, graffiti and neglected vacant lots; coordinate community volunteers to engage in street cleanup efforts; acknowledge and publicly recognize communities where improved responses to blight have been demonstrated.

Measurement: Log frequency of service calls; volume of recycling collected; usage rates of convenience centers; delivery method of communication campaign; and, number of volunteer education and cleanup events.
